What is Plagiarism?



Plagiarism

ACCORDING TO THE MERRIAM-WEBSTER ONLINE DICTIONARY, TO "PLAGIARIZE" MEANS

- to steal and pass off (the ideas or words of another) as one's own
- to use (another's production) without crediting the source
- · to commit literary theft
- to present as new and original an idea or product derived from an existing source



You Plagiarize by

- turning in someone else's work as your own
- copying words or ideas from someone else without giving credit
- failing to put a quotation in quotation marks
- giving incorrect information about the source of a quotation
- changing words but copying the sentence structure of a source without giving credit
- copying so many words or ideas from a source that it makes up the majority of your work, whether you give credit or not



Types of Plagiarism

• 1. CLONE:

 An act of submitting another's work, wordfor-word, as one's own.

• 2. CTRL-C:

 A written piece that contains significant portions of text from a single source without alterations.

3. FIND-REPLACE:

 The act of changing key words and phrases but retaining the essential content of the source in a paper.

• 4. REMIX:

 An act of paraphrasing from other sources and making the content fit together seamlessly.

5. RECYCLE:

 The act of borrowing generously from one's own previous work without citation; To self plagiarize.

6. HYBRID:

 The act of combining perfectly cited sources with copied passages—without citation—in one paper.

7. MASHUP:

A paper that represents a mix of copied material from several different sources without proper citation.

8. 404 ERROR:

A written piece that includes citations to non-existent or inaccurate information about sources

9. AGGREGATOR:

The "Aggregator" includes proper citation, but the paper contains almost no original work.

• 10. RE-TWEET:

 This paper includes proper citation, but relies too closely on the text's original wording and/or structure.

PLAGIARISM

At its Special Meeting held on Wednesday, 12 November, 2014, and arising, from the recommendations of the Senior Staff Disciplinary Committee, Council observed with concern, that the issue of Plagiarism has become rampant among members of the academic staff.

This was considered as incompatible with the ethics of the academic profession in the University and the position of government on this unethical act.

Consequently, Council decided that, henceforth, any member of staff involved in act(s) of plagiarism should be dismissed from the services of the University.






Creating a Profile

- Select your language
- Click on the 'Create Account' link on the homepage and the Create a User Profile page will open.
- Click on the 'Student' link.
- Fill in the required information in the new user profile form.
- Use 'Class ID' & 'join password' sent by your instructor.

Class Homepage


 Your class will show up on your Student Homepage.

Submitting a Paper

Click the "Submit" button.

 The paper submission page will open. Enter a title for your paper.

- Students have a choice to upload a file from:
 - √ Single File Upload
 - ✓ Choose from this computer,
 - √ Choose from Dropbox
 - ✓ Choose from Google Drive
 - √ Copy & Paste
- Select the file for submission.
- Look over the preview and then confirm.
- A copy of the receipt will be e-mailed to you.



Viewing an Originality Report

- After submission, Turnitin processed and generate Originality Report
- To open click the paper "similarity icon" or click on the "View" in the Portfolio of your class homepage.



Document Viewer

- Match Overview
- · All Sources
- Filter & Settings
- · Text only



Originality Report

 Provides a summary of matching or highly similar text found in a submitted paper.

 The decision to deem any work plagiarized must be made only after in depth examination of both the submitted paper and suspect sources in accordance with the standard of the institution.
